



Partner Patty Covington comments for Automotive News on dealer discriminatory lending

Automotive News spoke to [Patty Covington](#), Co-Chair of Hudson Cook's [Automotive and Personal Property Finance and Leasing](#) practice, about the lessons dealerships should learn from the FTC's recent settlement with Bronx Honda. According to *Automotive News*, the case marks the first time the regulator has brought an unlawful discrimination claim against a car retailer, which could be a gateway to increased enforcement actions against dealerships by the FTC.

Patty noted that the case is significant and potentially sets a precedent for the FTC's approach. "It would behoove a dealer to start paying attention to the issue of unlawful discrimination," said Patty. "If it's bad enough, a federal regulator is going to move against discrimination." Dealerships should conduct a review of their business practices to ensure they have fair lending standards in place, that they are being documented properly and adhered to by staff.
